Unpredicted except perhaps through science fiction, movie scripts, and novels, the Covid-19 pandemic has changed everyday life, caused wide-scale illness and death, and provoked preventive measures like social distancing, confinement, and school closures. We are in the midst of a revolution.

As states began to reopen, individuals were itching to return back to "normal." The problem? Nobody knows what "normal" is anymore. Even with a vaccine for the coronavirus, human

behavior and personal politics created confusion and stilted our progress.

During the Great Recession in 2009, Ian Morgan Davis, former managing partner at McKinsey and Company, a global management consulting firm, wrote, "The question is, 'What will normal look like?' Because we have been away from our campuses, our departments, our classrooms and our coworkers, I am so excited to be back in the midst of colleagues! This parallels our past lives of in-person workplace conversations, lunches (and happy hours) and reduced interruptions during the workday.

So on behalf of the ICTA board and the planning committee, I would like to welcome you to the 2021 Illinois Communication and Theater Association Convention. Our theme this year teetered with the changes in the country and was slow in coming. Join us in what we hope will be an offering of ideas that will prepare us all to approach new challenges in a meaningful way!

Using movies as a teaching tool, we engage in the suspense, humor, acting, and dialogue of cinema. However, it is specific elements of film-style (or "ways of seeing") that actually tell the most compelling story. Spatial relationships between characters, camera position and movements, striking imagery, editing, lighting, colors, and the like contain inferred meaning worth exploring in our classrooms. Panelists will discuss the extent to which "film style" equates to "film language." You can teach students "the filmic alphabet," so that they may "read into" what a filmic "author" is trying to say.

#### EDITH MARJORIE HARROD AWARD

Edith served as President of the Illinois Speech and Theatre Association in 1966, and was a member of the Illinois Board of Education for five years. She taught Drama and English at Eureka High School from 1943 to 1951. She taught Drama at Pekin Community High School from 1951 to 1971. She was an Associate Professor of Creative Arts at Illinois Central College where she taught Speech and Drama until her death in 1976. At Illinois Central College she created an interdisciplinary course in the humanities including art, drama, music and philosophy. She received her B.A. degree from Eureka College in 1943, and her M.A. degree from the University of Iowa in 1949. She completed additional graduate study at Northwestern University in Evanston and the University of Minnesota. In 1961, she was awarded the John Hay Fellowship in Humanities. She attended symposia on theater at Stratford, Ontario, Canada, in 1965, 1966 and 1968, studying with Tyrone Guthrie, who helped establish the Shakespeare Festival there, and who founded the Guthrie Theater in Minneapolis. She was director of Broadway Theater League and Cornstock Theater. She directed plays for Cornstock Theater and at Illinois Central College directed Readers' Theater and Plays for Living. The Harrod award is In recognition of distinguished service to the Association and outstanding achievement in the profession.

Julie Weishar is currently the Program Director for Communication and Chair of the Fine and Applied Arts Department at Parkland College. She earned her Master's Degree in Speech and Theatre from the University of Illinois Chicago and taught in various high schools in Illinois and Virginia, also working as a forensics coach and judge whenever possible. She began teaching Communication courses part-time at Tidewater Community College. In the mid-1990's Julie and her family moved to Champaign, Illinois, where she taught at Parkland College part-time, before being hired to teach full-time in 2001. During her 25+ years at Parkland, she developed curriculum for numerous communication courses and was instrumental in reinstating the forensics team, starting a Speech Lab (now the Presentation Center), and co-founding the annual David Jones Persuasive Speech Contest for Parkland students. Besides chairing many college-wide committees at Parkland, Julie has also represented community colleges and the communication profession by serving on two IAI (Illinois Articulation Initiative) Panels—the Gen Ed Communication Panel (which she also co-chaired) and the Theater Panel. In 2010, Julie received the Illinois Community College Trustees Association's Outstanding Full-Time Faculty Award.

Julie first learned about ISTA (now ICTA) in the mid-1980s, and became active in ISTA/ICTA after returning from her time teaching in Virginia. In 2009, she joined the ICTA Board as the Higher Ed Chair, subsequently serving in other positions including President in 2017-18. She notes that it has been a pleasure and an honor to serve on the Board and work with such talented and dedicated colleagues. Julie has been very active in ICTA, CSCA, and NCA, participating and presenting at many conferences. Julie says she is indebted to the wonderful professionals she has met through ICTA and is inspired by their dedication to helping students be successful.

This award is presented to an outstanding college major in speech or theatre who has made significant contributions to the college, community and discipline.
